President's Corner

Few people have ever heard of Albert McMakin. In fact he is not even mentioned in Wikipedia. He was a 24 year old farmer who grew up on a dairy farm in the 1930's in Park Ride, NC, just outside of Charlotte. He was good friends with a teen on the adjourning farm, who he played ball with, and on at least one occasion, raised a calf with. When the calf got to the veal stage, the boys marketed it and split the proceeds.

The boy next door, was average in every way. He came from a religious, "Scottish Presbyterian family believing in strict observance of moral values, and stayed relatively uncontaminated by the Great Gatsby lifestyle of the flapper era, with its fast dancing and illegal drinking." As far as church was concerned though, his father admitted, "he went along with the family to church every week only "grudgingly, or of necessity."

When he was almost 16, an evangelist, Dr. Mordecai Ham, came to Charlotte for 11 weeks, and preached the Gospel every night and every morning (except Mondays). The teen's parents desperately wanted their son to join them and hear the preacher, but he stubbornly refused.

It was his friend Albert McMakin, who ultimately convinced him to go, adding the incentive of letting him drive his old vegetable truck into town for the meeting. That night, at the age of 15, Billy Graham committed his life to Jesus. Billy later conceded, "I have no recollection of what he preached about, but I was spellbound. In some indefinable way he was getting through to me. I was hearing another voice: the voice of the Holy Spirit."

The rest is history. Looking back over the last 83 years, one can see how God called, prepared and led an ordinary young man to preach the Good News of Jesus Christ to nearly 215 million people in more than 185 countries.

But it was Albert McMakin who brought, (sponsored), Billy Graham for the Mordecai Ham rally that night.

Over the years, it has been <u>you</u>, the RIMA community who have sponsored many, many Pescadores, who have since gone home to their churches to be enthusiastic members, and leaders in their congregations. Quite a few have even been called into the ministry – and I have to believe that their Tres Dias experience had something to do with it. 38th Annual Assembly of Tres Dias Secretariats July 14-16, 2018 Palestine, Texas

RIMA was well represented at this year's Assembly. Judy and Eric Borman, Jeanne Norwood, John McKinney and Sue and Gordon Arent were in attendance for all three days.

The Keynote address was given by our own Alex Tindall's father!, Rev. Mike Tindall, Pastor of Grace Bible Church, Grapeland, Texas.

Mike reflected about going through his own weekend and noted that when the focus is on Jesus Christ above everything — when all points back to Jesus, we connect with one another in a most beautiful way. He further reflected that those who serve on weekends come from diverse backgrounds and how well they served one another through Jesus Christ. Mike concluded that through his Tres Dias experience, he has re-connected with Christ and now enjoys a wonderful ministry.

The Keynote Address was followed by the Procession of Banners. This is always a very moving experience for me and I was honored to carry the RIMA banner!

There were 163 total attendees; 50 official delegates, representing 30 communities.

The total number of delegate votes represented by delegates present was 86. The total number of delegate votes represented by Proxy votes was 99.

Teresa Babb gave information on the voting process, and the results of the proxy voting.

Proxy Vote # 1:

Do you approve the proposed budget of \$51,615.00 (Fifty- one thousand, six hundred nd fifteen dollars) for Fiscal Year 2018 (July 15, 2017 through July 13, 2018)?

Results: This vote passed by a majority. Results of the votes: 86 votes yes; 13 no.

Proxy Vote # 2:

The Assessment Tier Structure

Do you approve the proposed Change in Tier Structure from the previous flat rates per Tier to the "Per New Pescadore Rate" with a minimum of \$100.00 per annum assessment.

The new tier levels would be as follows:

New Assessment Structure 2017			
Pescadores	Tier	Tier Amount	
0-50	1	\$ 5.00 per new pescadore or \$100.00 minimum	
51-100	2	\$ 6.00 per new pescadore	
101-150	3	\$ 7.50 per new pescadore	
151-175	4	\$ 8.50 per new pescadore	
176+	5	\$ 10.00 per new pescadore	

Results: This vote passed by a majority. Results of the votes: 70 votes yes; 28 no. One community did not vote on the proxy vote.

Eric Borman was elected as an Alternate to the Secretariat to be called on as a replacement for any unexpired term. Susan Farkas stepped down as Secretariat member, so Eric became a member of the Secretariat.

Leigh Valley, Abundant Life and Mid-Hudson Tres Dias proposed a change to the Essentials 3.2.10: "That the team and candidates live in a cloistered environment for the entire weekend. Proposed change: 3.2.10: "That the team and candidates live in a cloistered environment for the weekend; ending upon completion of the Apostolic Hour at which time the Candidates become Pescadores." (or up to the closing, or at the completion of the Apostolic Hour) Policy Committee will develop the actual motion. There will be a Special Assembly called 45 days after the proposed motion is sent to all chartered communities.

The meeting was closed with prayer following the Installation of newly elected officers.

River trip takes paddlers on 400-mile spiritual quest

Charles Montgomery welcomed the challenge of hiking the steep terrain of the Connecticut River headwaters in remote northern New Hampshire, admiring the birds, the plants, the woods. He also loved the opportunity to

For four days, the 82-year-old retired doctor was part of the first leg of a 40-day pilgrimage of canoeists and kayakers of all faiths along the 400-mile river, New England's longest. The group traded cellphones for paddles to partake in a spiritual journey, the first event of its size on the river, which flows from the Canadian border to Long Island Sound.

"You begin to let go of stuff," said Montgomery, of Walpole, New Hampshire.

The Episcopal dioceses of New England and a group called Kairos Earth organized the "River of Life" pilgrimage. The idea came from Robert Hirschfeld, New Hampshire's bishop. Hirschfeld, 56, an avid rower, sees the journey as a way for people to renew their relationship with God, connect with one another and with nature, and have fun.

"It's become something far greater than I had imagined," said Hirschfeld, who traveled the first leg and plans to get back on the river with his daughter next week in Hanover, New Hampshire.
